Special Meeting to discuss the Strategic Planning for the Master Plan

Michael Kaper called the special meeting to order at 5:03 p.m. The meeting was held with the following Board Members present: Jon Kochis, Rick Szabrak, Scott Richardson, Bill Fagan, Bill McNeer, and Michael Kaper. Glenn Burns was absent. Also present were Staci Knisley, Patrick Rooney, Haylee Koester, Nick Brown, Stephanie Niese, and Ben Cooley.

Mr. Brown and Ms. Niese with Crawford Murphy Tilly, Inc. reviewed the draft master plan with the Board Members. See draft Master Plan (including survey responses) attached to minutes.

Ms. Niese reviewed the survey that was sent out to tenants and surrounding businesses. There were hard copies left at the airport terminal along with Ms. Knisley sending an email link.

Ms. Niese will follow-up on security comment relating to the engine monitor stolen.

Mr. Richardson commented that that there was about a 1/3 of responses for the survey. He asked if that rate was good compared to other surveys.

Mr. Brown reported that based on previous experience, 27 responses was pretty good based on his experience.

Ms. Niese reported that one of the responses was from KMGW out of Morgantown, West Virginia requesting tie down ropes. KMGW frequently stops and purchases fuel here.

Mr. McNeer reported that the airport does not offer tie down ropes any longer due to liability.

Mr. Kochis asked if there was any value always having the survey up online and available. He would like to see feedback regularly especially from the itinerant customers.

Mr. Szabrak suggested that having the survey sent out annually would be helpful.

Mr. Brown continued to review the draft Master Plan with the Board. The Fleet Mix Forecast portion of the plan is a required part of the FAA. It provides the justification for the maintenance and improvements for the Airport.

Mr. Brown asked the Board to keep in mind the FAA projects no growth in aircrafts. It is not uncommon for the FAA to project no growth in aircrafts in general aviation airports. We know differently based on the data collected locally. We are showing a .6% growth per year for the next 20 years in our baseline scenario. The second scenario based on the population; we are showing a .83% growth in aircraft for the next 20 years.

Mr. Richardson asked how this projection will blend in for the potential to build new hangars.

Mr. Brown reported that they will use this projection to justify the need to build new hangars on how many and when.

Mr. Rooney reported that they are getting calls about hangar ramp space. The hangar waiting list is real.

Mr. Brown continued to review the draft plan relating to itinerate operations. We are losing a fair portion of data related to flight plans. It only captures a portion of what occurs due to pilots not starting or filing their flight plan. With FBO data collected, we were able to reconcile the flight plans and capture more information and then came up with the number of operations from 2015-2020. Helicopter flights are included in the itinerate operations.

Mr. Kochis asked why filed flight plans in 2015 were so high in 2015 compared to 2016-2020.

Mr. Brown relies on the FBO data and the Board's knowledge.

Mr. Rooney reported that Company Wrench used to fly 3-4 times a week. They have cut down their flying due to the costs.

Mr. Szabrak stated that the data shows that the itinerate traffic is about 3-4 times a day.

Mr. Rooney reported that instrument training flies out about 5-6 times a day.

Mr. Brown stated the local flight operations are estimated at about 20 operations an hour per day. Not all flight lessons are pattern work. We are averaging that down to 12 operations an hour per day.

Mr. Brown reported that if the FAA agrees to our projections, they will update their records for Fairfield County's growth.

Mr. Brown reported that OSU Airport's proposed master plan is at 1.1% growth per operations. The based aircraft growth rate is 1.78 %.

Mr. Brown asked for feedback from the Board relating to the TAF Itinerant Local Split of 5% Itinerant and 95% local. He feels that the Itinerate rate is very low. This is based on the FBO and public information collected. He asked if there was anything else out there that indicates why it is so low. This is uncommon for this type of airport. He feels it should be closer to a 70/30 split.

Mr. Kochis reported that the security camera crashed in April. We lost about a year of information. We should be able to provide a snapshot soon of the operations.

Mr. Brown state that they will take the information on the video and compare to the FAA information and update the itinerate operations if needed.

Mr. Rooney reported that the current split is because we are high on local operations. A lot is driven by gas prices. We go through a truck load of gas a month. Surrounding airports are still operating on gas they bought in 2020 at cheaper rates due to their lack of flight activity. He has tried to explain to customers that they are buying old fuel.

Mr. Brown continued to review the draft plan relating to Fleet Mix. The future critical aircraft, BII, goes along with the airfield and runway Fairfield County has today.

Mr. Burns entered the meeting at 5:54 p.m.

Mr. Brown continued to review the draft plan relating to the forecast summary.

Mr. Szabrak asked Mr. Rooney to clarify the hangar waiting list.

Mr. Rooney stated that at least 3-5 people out of the 32 people on the hangar waiting list that already have aircrafts.

Mr. Kochis stated that in the near short term future, they will be a few hangars freed up after the storage building is built.

Mr. Brown asked the Board to send additional feedback in the next few days. We will update and modify as needed. They will build the report that will be submitted to the FAA. The FAA will review and comment. There are two chapters the FAA will approve; the forecast and ALP. They will still want to see all the other chapters of the plan.

Mr. Brown stated that he will not be at the next meeting. There should be little information presented in August. He will let the Board know if a 5:00 special meeting is necessary.

Dr. Burns stated that they are in recess at 6:08 p.m.

Regular Meeting to order

Dr. Burns called the Regular Meeting to order at 6:13 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance. The meeting was held with the following Board Members present: Glenn Burns, Michael Kaper, Jon Kochis, Scott

Richardson, Bill McNeer, Bill Fagan, and Rick Szabrak. Also present were Staci Knisley, Patrick Rooney, Haylee Koester, Nick Brown, Stephanie Niese, Ben Cooley, and Al Moyer.

Opportunity for the Public to Address the Board

There was no public comment.

Approval of the Minutes for the June 14, 2021 Meeting

On motion of Bill McNeer and second of Michael Kaper, the Fairfield County Airport Authority Board voted to approve the minutes from the June 14, 2021 meeting.

Voting aye thereon: Kochis, McNeer, Burns, Szabrak, Richardson, Kaper and Fagan Motion passed.

Historical Aircraft Squadron (HAS) update

Mr. Moyer reported that HAS will not be able to repair the brakes on the snowplow truck.

Mr. Kochis reported that he will have information related to the Engineer's Office donating another truck to the Airport.

Mr. Kochis confirmed with Mr. Moyer and Mr. Kelsey with HAS that they will do a flyover on Monday, October 10 for the Fairfield County Fair opening.

Mr. Moyer will put the event on their schedule.

Mr. McNeer stated that he wanted to make sure we reimburse HAS for the solution spray and other protective property equipment (PPE) for the spraying project.

Sundowner Aviation/Airport Manager Update - Monthly Board Report

a. Monthly Report

Mr. Rooney presented the Airport Management Monthly Report. (See attached to minutes)

Mr. Rooney reported that three (3) new people have bought aircrafts and our interested in renting hangars once we have an opening. Two (2) of the interested people are students.

Standing Committee Updates:

Airport Improvement - Jon Kochis

a. Engineer's Summary Report - Crawford Murphy Tilly, Inc. (CMT)

Mr. Cooley reviewed the CMT report. (See attached to minutes)

Mr. Cooley reported that the Taxiway B and Improve Airfield Drainage is in the design phase. There will be a lot of conversation with Soil & Water and other agencies. Bidding and construction will be underway in 2022. There are two (2) main drainage lines; one on the east end and the one that is failing that has a bump over the runway. The intent is to repair as much pavement as possible when the pipe is repaired.

Mr. Kochis asked the Board to note the engineering study was funding by the FAA which also means there is a lien to intent to fund construction next year. The discretionary funding takes all our entitlement.

Mr. Cooley reported that they had a good call with the FAA today. Everything is lining up with FY2022.

Mr. Kochis state that a portion of the funding might be able to pay for the displacement of the threshold.

Mr. Cooley stated that there will be a time the taxiway will be closed.

Mr. Kochis reported that there has been a slight delay in the Snow Removal & Equipment (SRE) building due to the Board of Commissioners advertising for a request for qualifications (RFQ) for the SWAT building portion of the project. The bids will be closed this Friday. CMT intends on sending in their RFQ.

Mr. Moyer asked if the old lights and taxiway signs were a part of any of the grants.

Mr. Cooley stated the obstruction lights are not included but will follow up to see about the signs.

b. South Access Road/Culvert Repair

Mr. Kochis stated that he expects that it will be completed by Roese Brothers in August and September.

c. Storm Water System Rehab

North area of property

Mr. Kochis reported that back when the Frear property was purchased, there was not a FEMA floodplain designation. In 2012 FEMA redid their floodplain in many areas and designated the area in concern. There is a little bit of limitation on the Frear Property on where we can build

because of the floodplain. As we move forward with this project and in the future the development of the taxiway to the north, we must address the floodplain or channel the diversion. Step 1 is passing the water through culvert. Step 2 is passing the water from the ditch and down off our property We can make a massive culvert, but we would be liable downstream. There is a delicate area to balance. Because of the pipelines, this area is the least likely area of the Airport for us to develop.

This area has a section with a very high hump which creates a steep side. The first goal is to lay the area back to a 3 to 1 ratio to give the channel more width. This will make the area easier to mow by making the sides a little less steep. Option 2 is to take and make a lazy flow off the property, giving it a wider slower pace north of the pipelines off the property. This would make this part of the property usable. To develop this property, the cost would far exceed the space that is available at the Airport. He has had a conversation with Texas Eastern pipeline. They will drain the area. We are looking for someone to design field tile that will cut across. Texas Eastern will allow us to build this in their easement because their line is dead. They are not giving up their easement. The challenge is the base flood elevation hits the pipeline, there is only about a foot of cover at the bottom of the creek. The creek cannot go any lower. The elevation needs the grade corrected from our property to Greenfield Dam in conjunction with Hunters Run to make FEMA floodplains to go away.

Mr. Cooley reported that the FAA agreed to cover the replacement of the pipe to the entrance and exit. The next phase would be thinking through the old skydive area. It's a multi-phase project.

• Ouarterly Stormwater report (see attached to minutes)

The Board reviewed the quarterly stormwater report.

Strategic Planning Committee - Bill McNeer, Jon Kochis, Rick Szabrak

Nothing new to report.

Community Relations - Michael Kaper & Rick Szabrak

Mr. Kaper reported that there have been email inquiries relating to events with HAS. We are still getting scam emails.

Facilities and Grounds - Michael Kaper & Bill Fagan

Mr. Kochis reported that there are some hangars in need of a paint job. He recommends that some of the hangars be painted. This would be paid out of operational maintenance. He recommends 1 or 2 rows to start off. He does not see this being a huge cost.

Mr. McNeer will follow up with estimates.

FBO Liaison - Scott Richardson

Mr. Richardson gave kudos to Mr. Rooney for the June 26 party at the airport.

Finance - Glenn Burns

a. Financial Reports

- Mr. Kochis suggested a maintenance plan on the repair of hangars.

On motion of Bill McNeer and second of Scott Richardson, the Fairfield County Airport Authority Board voted to approve the payment of bills totaling \$ 25,381.56 (See invoice summary attached to minutes)

Voting aye thereon: McNeer, Richardson, Burns, Fagan, Szabrak, Kochis, and Kaper Motion passed.

Motion to approve retroactively June payment of invoices totaling \$17,772.08

On motion of Jon Kochis and second of Michael Kaper, the Fairfield County Airport Authority Board motioned to approve retroactively June invoices totaling \$17,772.08 (See attached to minutes)

Voting aye thereon: Kochis, Kaper, Burns, McNeer, Richardson, Fagan, and Szabrak Motion passed.

FAA CRRSA Grant fund

Ms. Knisley reported that the grant is now completed. The grant was able to cover the fuel truck repair and another minor operational repair. A cash advance was originally approved to fund the expenses until the grant fund was reimbursed. The cash advance now needs repaid.

Approval to repay advance from the FAA CRRSA Grant Fund# 7803 to Airport Operations Fund# 7800

On motion of Jon Kochis and second of Rick Szabrak, the Fairfield County Airport Authority Board voted to repay advance of \$13,000 from the CRRSA Grant Fund# 7803 to Airport Operations Fund# 7800.

Voting aye thereon: Kochis, Szabrak, Burns, Fagan, Richardson, Kaper, and McNeer Motion passed.

• FAA American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act 2021 Grant

Mr. Kochis reported that there was a third funding approved due to COVID. The ARP grant could cover some operational costs.

Motion to approve retroactively the \$32,000 FAA American Rescue Plan Act 2021 grant application

On motion of Jon Kochis and second of Michael Kaper, the Fairfield County Airport Authority Board voted to approve retroactively the \$32,000 FAA American Rescue Plan Act 2021 grant application.

Voting aye thereon: Kochis, Kaper, Burns, Fagan, Richardson, Szabrak, and McNeer Motion passed.

Mr. Kochis suggested that the Board replace the HVAC unit that feeds this area of the terminal. We are currently adding sanitization techniques to the county facilities HVAC units. He recommends adding the sanitization techniques to the new unit and upgrading the old unit. He estimates that replacing the unit should be under \$10,000. This would be a great project and would add sanitization to the air.

Mr. Kochis recommends the Board give him authorization with a not to exceed amount.

Approval to authorize Jon Kochis to proceed with replacement of the HVAC unit and to add air sterilization with a not to exceed of \$12,000 with the FAA ARP funds

On motion of Michael Kaper and second of Bill Fagan, the Fairfield County Airport Authority Board voted to authorize Jon Kochis to proceed with replacement of the HVAC unit and to add air sterilization with a not to exceed of \$12,000 with the FAA ARP funds.

Voting aye thereon: Kaper, Fagan, Burns, Szabrak, McNeer, Richardson, and Kochis Motion passed.

Ms. Knisley reported that the agreement has not been received yet. She expects the grant to be good until approximately 2026. The funding can also be used for operational costs such as the hangar repairs.

Security & Safety - Jon Kochis & Bill McNeer

Nothing new to report.

Tenant Relations - Glenn Burns & Bill Fagan

a. Rent Status Spreadsheet

The board reviewed the spreadsheet and summary.

b. P20 tenant – eviction process

Ms. Knisley reported that Mr. Abdullahi made a payment of \$1,359.60 on June 14, 2021. This covered rent including late fees for July through December of 2020.

Mr. Kochis asked the Prosecutor's Office to proceed with the eviction process.

Web - Bill McNeer & Rick Szabrak

Mr. Szabrak reported that he has made a few updates to highlight the Young Eagles program.

Old Business

a. Fuel Truck

Mr. Kochis reported that the technician installed the cartridge. They did a test onsite and checked in with Airport management.

Mr. Rooney reported that the only problem left is our system does not provide enough pressure to open the valve, so we have to go up top and open the door.

Mr. Kochis reported that the technician said we do not have enough pressure per gallons per minute.

b. Snow Removal Equipment (SRE) Facility

c. HAS equipment storage

d. Costs for storage – lease addendum

Mr. McNeer stated that the objective is to have the lease updated in January.

Mr. Kochis recommended that the addendum include the outside storage. This will have to be requested by the tenant and would only apply to the R hangar tenants.

Mr. Rooney stated that both tenants that use outside storage currently. They also have heat and generators because they need to paint. They pay for their own electric charges. There also fans used. He views this as commercial use not additional storage.

Mr. McNeer stated that there is additional space used and recommends that the additional use be added to their lease.

Mr. Rooney stated that any outside storage use will be brought to the Board's attention.

Dr. Burns stated that this topic can now be taken off old business.

e. Hangar waiting list policy

Mr. Kochis suggested that the board create a policy for the hangar waiting list, such as adding a security deposit.

Ms. Knisley suggested that the waiting list should only be for those who have a verified tail# through the FAA registry.

Mr. Rooney stated that they currently go to the top of the waiting list when a hangar is available. If they do not have an aircraft when a hangar is open, they go to the bottom of the list.

f. Draft Lease for hangars

Mr. Kochis recommended approving the new language relating to the eviction process and put on the web.

g. Hangar J lease (name change)

Mr. Kochis reported that there is an addendum signed by Jimmy Shadd with the new name change. He will forward on to Ms. Knisley.

h. Metal building for fuel truck

Mr. Kochis recommended that the metal building project begin now that the fuel truck is back in service. He will get quotes for next meeting.

New Business

Meeting time change discussion

Mr. Kaper proposed that an earlier time be discussed for the regular board meetings. He recommends an earlier time for the regular meetings.

Dr. Burns said it could be a problem for him to have earlier meetings due to his work schedule.

Mr. Kochis would like to see the regular meeting time to change to 4:00 or 5:00 p.m.








COVID Recovery



Operations per Based Aircraft




TAF Itinerant Local Split






Operations Projections





Baseline – Scenario 2: Fairfield Employment








Based Aircraft Projections


High Case – Scenario 2: Fairfield Population



Baseline – Scenario1: Fairfield Employment




